



From the Pastor's Desk. . .

How is it with your soul?

A couple of years ago, I preached on this question and told you that I would not let it drop off our radar. I vowed to return to it from time to time. So, here I am...bringing it up again.

If you missed or have forgotten that particular sermon, or if you don't remember your Methodist history, this question was asked at the beginning of class meetings with the original Methodist groups that John and Charles Wesley formed in the mid-1700s. A Methodist "Class" was a small group of people that met together on a regular basis to study the Bible and to hold each other accountable for Spiritual Disciplines. It would be the equivalent of a Sunday School class or an accountability group today.

When these groups would meet, the first question asked to everyone in the group was, "how is it with your soul?" This was more than just an ice breaker exercise. This was a carefully thought out, spiritually significant question that everyone was to ponder. If we are going to study God's word together...if we are going to hold each other accountable to Spiritual Disciplines and a Godly way of life, we should begin with periodic introspection of our own self. Think of it as the airplane oxygen mask analogy...you can't help someone else if you are in bad shape yourself. So, on an airplane, when oxygen masks appear, you are told to put yours on first to ensure that you are safe and then to begin helping those around you who need assistance.

If we are going to hold each other accountable spiritually, we need to examine our own spirit first. So, thus arises the question...How is it with your soul?

The importance of this question cannot be overstated. You see, we have a tendency, as humans, to let our souls get tired and weary. We focus so much of our effort outward that we forget to look inward. In the church, we start to love and care about other people so much that we start pouring ourselves into them. Often, we do this at the peril of neglecting ourselves.

When I began preaching, I was told that I needed to worry about this question a lot because it was so easy for pastors to pour themselves into others that they forget to let someone pour into them. And then they become empty spiritually. And if they are empty spiritually, then they have nothing left to pour into others.

So, I will answer that question for myself as your pastor, and I will encourage you to spend time truly contemplating it for yourself. As for me, my soul is strong and healthy right now. I feel so certain that we, as a church, are following God's plan for us. You, as a congregation, have been so giving to us and have cared and loved on us so much that you have filled us up. This allows me to pour into you.

To make certain that my soul stays healthy and filled, I am going to take a couple of weeks away with Audrey on a trip that I'm sure will prove to be "the trip of a lifetime." I will be out of the pulpit for a couple of weeks in January, spending time with my wife, relaxing, and letting God pour into my soul so that I can come back healthier and stronger than ever before.

And I encourage you to spend some serious time looking inside yourself and answer the question, "how is it with your soul?" If you need some time away to refuel...take it. If you need healing...pray for it. If you need prayer...ask for it. If your soul is healthy and strong and your oxygen mask is on...help those around you who need help. That's what family is for.

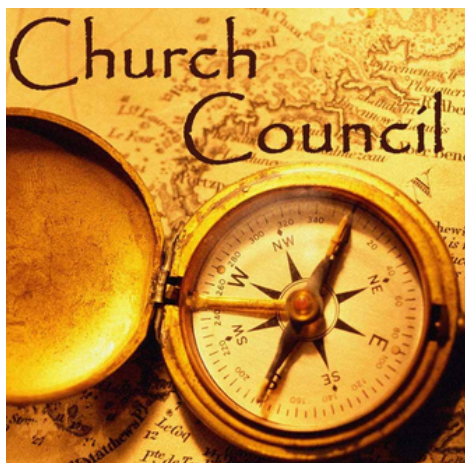

January Fun Facts

*January has two zodiac signs – It is appropriate the year is first celebrated with the professional and independent Capricorn (Dec. 22-Jan.19) and the intellectual and intuitive Aquarius (Jan. 19-Feb. 18).

*The *Dianthus caryophyllus* is the birth flower of January – more commonly known as the carnation!

*If you were born in January, your birthstone is the garnet which represents purity, truth and friendship!

*January is home of several awesome national monthly observances, including National Hobby Month, National Blood Donor Month, National Book Month, and National Thank You Month.

*The name for January comes from the Roman God Janus, who is always depicted with two heads. He uses one head to look back on the year before and the other head to look forward to the New Year!

*Originally, the Roman calendar had only 10 months, and it excluded January and February. King Numa Pompilius, the second king of Rome, is responsible for adding both January and February to the Roman calendar. He did this so calendars would be equivalent to a lunar year. Even so, it only had 30 days. Finally, Julius Caesar added the 31st day to the month and completed it to the full month of January that we practice now!

*Some historical names for January include “Wulfmonath,” which came from the Anglo-Saxons because it was the month hungry wolves would come scavenging. King Charlemagne would call it “Wintermanoth,” meaning “winter/cold month.”

*January was a monumental year for Alaska! As of January 3, 1959, Alaska officially became the 49th state of the United States.

*One of the most influential events in the U.S. happened in January – on January 1, 1892, Ellis Island opened, allowing for the immigration of over 20 million people!

*January brought the end of the monarchy in Hawaii when Queen Liliuokalani was forced to abdicate on the 24th of the month.

*Are you a fan of the stars? Celebrities that is! Then you'll be interested to know that the first-ever Emmy Awards were held on January 25, 1949.
